Wild Miami: Explore the Amazing Nature
in and Around South Florida
- a new book about Miami's amazing ecology
by Thomas Morrell, Shannon Jones, Brian Diaz,
and Fernando Bretos

Miami is a bustling city with a vibrant nightlife, but if you know where to look, its wildlife is just as wild. *Wild Miami* reveals the amazing ecology of this tropical metropolis. Equal parts natural history, field guide, and trip planner, *Wild Miami* has something for everyone. This handy yet extensive guide profiles over 300

local species, from beautiful flowers and towering palm trees to manatees and green treefrogs, spotted sunfish, and great blue herons. Included are 25 "field trip" sites that encourage readers to explore the natural wonders on trails, beaches, public parks, and in their own backyards. Finally, local conservation issues and organizations are highlighted throughout, guiding readers to make positive environmental impacts.

Award to George Gann with Grant for Richmond Pine Rocklands Restoration

George Gann, founder and Executive Director of the Institute for Regional Conservation (IRC), has been designated a National Geographic Explorer and was awarded the inaugural National Geographic Photo Ark Species Impact Initiative grant. This \$350,000 grant will be used to fund the ecological restoration of habitat for two federally endangered insects in the Richmond Pine Rocklands of Miami-Dade County. The focal species, Miami tiger beetle and Bartram's scrub-hairstreak butterfly are endemic to the pine rocklands ecosystem of southern Florida. IRC will lead the two-year project in collaboration with the US Fish and Wildlife Service, US Coast Guard, Zoo Miami, Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden, and other partners.

"On behalf of our many partners, I am deeply honored that the restoration of pine rocklands has been chosen for the inaugural Species Impact Initiative grant," Gann said. "The number of rare species in this ecosystem is staggering and the National Geographic Photo Ark will help us communicate that science-based restoration is imperative. For many species we are past the tipping point and must restore to conserve."

Pine rocklands comprise a globally imperiled ecosystem that exists only in southern Florida and parts of the Bahamas. They are home to 11 federally listed animals and 16 federally listed plants, and dozens more state listed and regionally rare species. In urban Miami-Dade County, pine rocklands have all but disappeared outside of Everglades National Park with less than 2% remaining.

Remembering Dr. David Lee

Dr. David Lee, Emeritus Professor at Florida International University, passed away on December 13, 2022. While not a longtime member of FNPS, Dr. Lee's roles at FIU influenced the education at FIU and careers of many of our members. He was the first botanist in the Department of Biological Sciences (1980); teacher across Biology, Landscape, Architecture, and Liberal studies programs; first chair of the Department of Environmental Studies and later Chair of the Department of Biological Sciences. He was also the impetus behind a memorandum of understanding between Fairchild Tropical Garden and FIU that combined the strength of both institutions.

In addition to many scientific publications, Dr. Lee also wrote "Wayside Trees of Tropical Florida: A Guide to the Native and Exotic Trees and Palms of Miami and Tropical South Florida" (2011, coauthored with Stacy West) and presented on this to DCFNPS.

SHARING PINE ROCKLAND NATIVES WITH NEIGHBORS ON A "WALK AND TALK" By David Reese

Don't you wish your love of native plants was a neighborhood thing? One group of native plant fans is actively trying to make that happen! On December 3, 2022, several homeowners in Miami's Shenandoah neighborhood hosted a native plant walk and talk, inviting the neighborhood by posting the event on Nextdoor Shenandoah and Eventbrite.

The result was a successful, fun and informative few hours on Saturday afternoon with beginning and experienced gardeners and children as young as three.

Five homes within a half-mile radius were visited. This urban corridor between Little Havana and Coconut Grove contains many Connect to Protect Network at Fairchild (CTPN) members who have planted pine rockland plants in their yards. With the idea of growing the wildlife corridor in this area, organizers mapped-out the route and posted the event on social media. They were thrilled to see so many show up to check out gardening with natives design options in some of the established native plant yards in the area. Homeowners discussed plant choices and designs in their yards, and planted seeds of ideas for their neighbors to recall when they're ready for a new garden project. This was also a great opportunity to get to meet and spend time outdoors with neighbors, something we take for granted in our busy lives.
