"The Germination Experiment: Uncovering the Secrets of *Tetrazygia bicolor* Through Statistical Analysis"

Presented by five AP Statistics students at Jose Marti MAST 6-12 Academy in Hialeah

(a magnet school of Miami-Dade County Public Schools)

AP Statistics students at Jose Marti MAST 6-12 Academy make the course come to life – literally – by designing and implementing

experiments with native plants. Through a collaboration with Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden, teacher Andy Kearns and the Fairchild conservation team choose a topic each year that addresses a particular need or knowledge gap involving native plants. For the 2022-2023 school year, propagation of *Tetrazygia bicolor* (*Miconia bicolor*), West Indian Lilac, was chosen as a topic for experimental design as conservation horticulturalists at Fairchild previously experienced some difficulty in producing plants from seed.

West Indian Lilac is a shrub or small tree with beautiful leave and flowers found in the margins of rockland hammocks and pine rocklands in Miami-Dade County and the West Indies and is listed as threatened by the state of Florida. (Photo: Andy Kearns)



Students designed experiments to compare germination rates of seeds in different substrates and to also compare germination of seeds that sink with seeds that float. Results of the experiments and lessons learned from the experience will be presented by five successful AP Statistics students who implemented their experiments and analyzed their results within the context of the course. (Don't worry, the science will be presented in a way to be accessible to those with a less-scientific bent.)



The presenters are Celine Hutchins (grade 12), Nestor Suarez (grade 12), Nicholas Baez (grade 11), Alejandro Ganaza (grade11), and Chris Miranda Jr. (grade 11).

Their teacher, **Andy Kearns**, is the Mathematics Department Chair, Botany & Research Instructor, Green Club / Fairchild Challenge Sponsor, and Professional Development Liaison at José Martí MAST. He is a long-time member of DCFNPS.

FIELD TRIP: Fakahatchee Strand Preserve State Park Saturday, December 9, 2023

Field trips are for the study of plants and enjoyment of nature by FNPS members and guests. Collecting is not permitted.

Saturday, December 9, 2023: Fakahatchee Strand State Preserve. This very special place is known for its cypress trees and wealth of bromeliads, orchids (probably none in bloom now) and ferns. We will wade in cool water possibly over 2 feet deep, and will go very slowly so no one falls; it may take 4-6 hours (water levels currently seem lower than average). We will walk between two trams for a distance of 1600 feet and along the trams. It shouldn't be arduous. Lunch/snack in the slough, it should be a lovely wet picnic! (Note: the boardwalk at the southern end of the strand 7 miles west of SR 29 on Tamiami Trail is closed.) https://www.floridastateparks.org/parks-and-trails/fakahatchee-strand-preserve-state-park

Leader: Russell Clusman, an orchid enthusiast with extensive experience in the Fakahatchee, and DCFNPS member.

Registration: Open to current Dade Chapter FNPS members. Registration is <u>limited to 20 participants</u>. Email Steve Woodmansee at steve@pronative.com to register. **Deadline for registration is December 7**th, **2023.**

<u>Bring/wear</u>: \$3 cash entrance fee per car. Long pants (not shorts) and long sleeves; sturdy, closed shoes (e.g., athletic shoes, don't even think about open toe!) that can get soaked, snake gaiters aren't a bad idea if you have any. A walking stick (mop handle works) is strongly recommended to help you negotiate underwater obstacles and climb over logs. Carry water to drink and lunch (we'll eat in the slough). Mosquitoes should not be out, but you may want to bring repellent. Pack anything valuable in plastic bags -- just in case. Dry pants and shoes for the ride home may feel good.

*** Although we have never had any major incidents on our field trips, this being a wild place, there are critters such as wasps, leeches, bears, panthers, alligators, and venomous snakes, plus unseen sticks, logs and holes under water. Our advice for what to wear/carry is for your safety and thus the enjoyment of the group. ***

<u>Difficulty</u>: Moderately difficult, not suitable for young children. Wading, climbing over logs, etc.

Don't be late! But if you are, try to call Patty's cell 305-878-5705 (if there is coverage). If you miss us at the office, proceed down the road past the office to where you see a large group of cars. If we have already departed, you are probably out of luck. Do not head into the water by yourself.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Dade Chapter FNPS - Year Ending June 30, 2023

This year our main source of income was from donations. On Give Miami Day 2022, members and friends generously contributed \$4363, while the Miami Foundation and an anonymous donor contributed even more, with a final total of \$6495.

Additionally, plant donations earned \$1768 in chapter plant sales and raffle ticket donations at meetings and Native Plant Day. Thank you to all who donated so many wonderful plants! These donations support the chapter as well as native plant gardens.

Our other main source of income continues to be membership dues. Dues paid to FNPS and donations paid directly to DCFNPS are 100% tax deductible (if you itemize). Thank you to Business and Not-For-Profit and Life members for their added support. The chapter again donated \$1500 to FNPS for Conservation Grants honoring chapter founders, the late Don and Joyce Gann. Educational activities (meetings and Native Plant Day) are the other main expenses.

The balance of the bequest from the estate of longtime member Dr. Robert Kelley received in 2008 remains in reserve for special expenses rather than ongoing needs and are not listed with our regular income.
